**FIELD TRIPS**

**Terrestrial: Wildlife Crossings at Vail Pass, Glenwood Canyon, and Gypsum**

This full-day terrestrial field trip includes a tour of the award-winning Glenwood Canyon Interstate 70 highway construction project, where various wildlife issues associated with the project will be viewed and discussed. The tour also includes stops on I-70 in the Vail Pass and Gypsum (Cottonwood Creek) areas to view several wildlife crossing structures. The 26-minute video, "Ancient Treasure Modern Marvel," describing the Glenwood Canyon project, will be shown on the bus between tour stops. Your tour guides include Jerry Powell, Ralph Trapani, Joe Elsen, and Kurt Broderdorp of Colorado DOT, and Sarah Barnum of the University of Colorado at Denver.

**Aquatic: Wetland and Stream Restoration in Summit County and Hoosier Creek**

This full-day field trip is planned in Summit County to view examples of stream and wetland mitigation sites on highway projects. The Snake River wetland restoration site along Highway 6 will be visited, followed by the relocation site of Tenmile Creek parallel to Interstate 70. The Hoosier Creek fen wetland restoration project near Highway 285 will be another site visit. There will also be a tour of several stream restorations between Breckenridge and Frisco in areas that were used for mining.
